


On behalf of the CCBA, I would like to share our exploring experience in youth bridg with you.

- 5.Improve students' bridge skills step by step.









Element:

Luck(honour) and crad distribution.

Card placement and selection.

Source of winning trick:

Honour.Long suit.(Ruff) and Crad distribution.
