An event involving 38 countries from so many different time zones means that an unusual format is required, all the matches having to be determined well in advance. That means that you may not meet teams with similar scores and may never encounter your closest rivals. The teams hoping to win or finish high up the leader board must aim for a significant victory point average over the course of the event. I wonder how many of the teams have made any estimation of what sort of average is required to be in with a chance of winning.

There are still three rounds to be completed and looking at the ever-changing scoreboard Athens Team, having competed nine matches are averaging 15.45 VP. Valkyrie has also completed nine matches for 13.82 VP. Alpert are on 15.17 VP but they have only played 6 matches.

With so many matches still to be played it is too soon to predict a winner, but it looks like an average of more than 15 VP will be required.





West led the  $\heartsuit 6$  for the king and ace and declarer played three rounds of clubs, discarding two hearts. West ruffed, cashed the  $\triangle A$  and continued with the  $\triangle 3$ . Declarer elected to ruff in dummy and then pitched the  $\heartsuit 10$  on the  $\triangle 10$ , West ruffing and exiting with the  $\triangle 6$ . When declarer discarded the  $\triangle 6$  from dummy East ruffed and played a heart. Declarer ruffed in dummy and played a diamond (a club saves a trick) and West could take the  $\lozenge AK$  and the  $\triangle K$  for five down, -1100 and 14 IMPs.

South led the  $\clubsuit2$  and declarer went up with dummy's  $\bigstar K$  and played a heart to the ten. When that passed off peacefully she cashed the  $\clubsuit K$  and played a club for the eight and queen. North returned the  $\bigstar10$  and when the  $\bigstar Q$  held declarer played a club to the ace and a diamond to the queen. South could win and cash two spades, but declarer had the rest, +600.



Here South led the  $\lozenge 4$  and having won with the  $\lozenge 8$  declarer played three rounds of clubs, South winning as North pitched the  $\lozenge 5$ . South switched to the  $\lozenge 9$  and when declarer played low from dummy North won with the  $\lozenge K$  and played a diamond for the queen and king. South exited with the  $\lozenge 7$  and declarer discovered there were only eight tricks available, -100 and a 12 IMP loss.

When South switches to the  $\heartsuit 9$  declarer must go up with dummy's  $\heartsuit A$  and play on spades. If South ducks twice, declarer goes to dummy with a club and plays a heart, establishing a ninth trick.

Opposite a vulnerable overcall with some well-placed hearts East was happy to double. West led the  $\heartsuit Q$  for the king and ace and East switched to the  $\clubsuit J$ . Declarer took the  $\spadesuit A$  and played the  $\clubsuit 2$  for the six, seven and queen. Back came a spade and West cashed the queen and king. At this point West needs to find the Garozzo like play of exiting with a club, tangling declarer's entries to such an extent that she cannot get up to nine tricks. Switching to the  $\diamondsuit J$  allowed declarer to unlock the  $\diamondsuit AQ$ , cross to the  $\clubsuit A$  and claim the rest, +550.


Declarer can avoid this by ducking East's spade switch. She wins the next spade and must play the \$10, East winning. Now there is no defence. If East exits with a club declarer can cash her winners in the suit, unlock the diamonds and exit with a heart, forcing East to surrender two more tricks to dummy.



Many years ago I wrote a Bols Bridge Tip about not being afraid to respond. It was considered by some to be heretical, but nowadays almost everyone has embraced it.

It would have served EW well here.

South led the  $\heartsuit 3$  (low from a doubleton) and North took the  $\heartsuit A$  and switched to the  $\clubsuit 9$ . The best declarer can do at this point is duck, win the next club and play the  $\diamondsuit K$ . If that holds she can cash the  $\heartsuit K$  for four down. When she won and exited with the  $\spadesuit Q$  the defenders could draw trumps and cash winners for five down, -1100.

If South leads the  $\P$ K on the go, two tricks is all declarer can hope for.

As an aside, once South has passed the double of  $1 \clubsuit$  West should probably do something, either redoubling for rescue or bidding  $1 \diamondsuit$ .



West won and exited with the  $\clubsuit$ 7. Declarer won with the  $\clubsuit$ Q and continued with the  $\heartsuit 10$ . If West takes that and exits with the  $\spadesuit J$ the contract will be two down, but when she ducked declarer could ruff a diamond, ruff a heart and cash the  $\bigstar$ K for +730 and 16 IMPs.

There is beautiful double dummy defence to 3. doubled.

West must start with two rounds of clubs, declarer ruffing and playing a heart. West wins and must now underlead in diamonds, East winning and playing a club. Declarer has to ruff high but when she plays a second heart West wins and plays the  $\Diamond A$ , forcing dummy to ruff. Now declarer cannot avoid the loss of one more trick.

Are you a fan of off-shape notrump openings? Perhaps this deal will persuade you?







It would not be much of a stretch for East to open  $1\clubsuit$  – but no one did. When West introduced her chunky hearts East had an easy raise. The question is how best to do so? The possibilities include a fit non jump of  $3\clubsuit$ , a fit jump of  $4\clubsuit$ , a support showing 2NT or  $3\spadesuit$ . With South marked with at most one heart it was surprising that North did not press on to  $4\spadesuit$ .

Declarer ruffed the spade lead in dummy and played a heart, South winning and switching to the  $\Diamond 2$ . That gave declarer the rest, +680.


