

Meanwhile, Alpert has the best average, 14.92 VP, ahead of Asja, with 14.18 VP and Athens Team on 14.10 VP.







North found the nasty lead of the 4 and when declarer eschewed the psychological try of playing dummy's 4 J hoping for a cover, she had to win with the 4 as South followed with the 4. A diamond to the ace and a diamond to the jack saw North win and switch to the 2 for the jack and queen and South returned the 2, the trick being competed by the 3 and 4 as dummy shed the 3. Back came the 10 and when South played the 4 declarer could mange no more than six tricks, -300.

The lead of the  $\Diamond 10$  was covered in turn by the jack, queen and ace and when the  $\Diamond 8$  took the next trick declarer was home, +600 and a 14 IMP swing.

West led the  $\clubsuit$ K and continued with the  $\clubsuit$ 5, East winning and switching to the  $\diamondsuit10$ . West won with the  $\diamondsuit$ A and returned the  $\heartsuit10$  to dummy's  $\heartsuit$ A. When declarer continued with the  $\bigstar2$  she was one down, -100.

Declarer knew West had the  $\diamond A$  and the  $\clubsuit KQ$ , but even if she held the  $\bigstar K$  a bid over  $3 \diamondsuit$  was unlikely. No one found the winning line of running dummy's  $\bigstar Q$ .





She won with dummy's  $\bigstarA$ , played a club to the ace, ruffed a club, played a heart to the ten, ruffed a club, came to hand with the  $\heartsuit Q$ , cashed the  $\bigstar K$  and played two rounds of hearts pitching a diamond, +980 and 11 IMPs.

You might like to look out Board 22. At one table declarer managed to lose a trump trick with a combined holding of AKQJ74 opposite 965 – and that was after a trump lead.







South won and played two rounds of clubs, North ruffing and switching to the  $\heartsuit 2$ . South won with the  $\heartsuit J$  and played a club, North ruffing as declarer pitched the  $\heartsuit 9$ . Declarer took the spade return with the  $\P K$  and exited with a spade, North ruffing and exiting with a heart. She still hand the  $\Diamond KJ$  so that was two down, -1000.



I'm not convinced that the West hand is one on which you should overcall a strong club, but when North doubled to show some cards all danger had passed.

West led the  $\heartsuit$ 6 and declarer won with the  $\heartsuit$ J and played the  $\clubsuit$ 2, West taking the  $\clubsuit$ K and exiting with a heart. Declarer won with the  $\heartsuit$ A, played a club to the queen, a spade to the ace, cashed the  $\clubsuit$ A and ruffed a club. She exited from dummy with the  $\diamondsuit$ J and West won with the queen. When she continued with the  $\diamondsuit$ A declarer scored the  $\heartsuit$ 5, escaping for two down, -200 and a 15 IMP loss.

I started my coverage of the penultimate session at 10.30 GMT. At that stage the leading averages remained the same.


Let's start with a question.

Looking at  $\bigstar K64 \otimes KJ102 \bigstar AK832 \bigstar 4$ you open 1 $\diamond$  and partner responds 1 $\otimes$ . Do you rebid  $2\otimes$ ,  $3\otimes$  or  $4\otimes$ ?

To my way of thinking this is a classic Goldilocks situation.  $2\heartsuit$  is too little,  $4\heartsuit$  is too much and  $3\heartsuit$  is just right.

There was one vote for  $1 \heartsuit$  and one for  $4 \heartsuit$ , the rest opting for  $3 \heartsuit$ . One player opted for a Splinter of  $4 \clubsuit$ . If you think the East hand is strong enough to insist on game it is not a bad description.

Appreciating that NS were worried about hearts East led the  $\heartsuit$ A, West contributing the  $\heartsuit$ 5 (count, high encouraging) and declarer the  $\heartsuit$ Q. At this point a diamond switch is essential, West winning, cashing the  $\heartsuit$ K and then playing a diamond or simply returning a diamond immediately, but it is not easy to find, and East went with the  $\clubsuit$ 4, declarer winning with the  $\clubsuit$ Q. Declarer cashed the  $\clubsuit$ A, ruffed a club and played the  $\diamondsuit$ 10, but West took the  $\diamondsuit$ K and calmly returned the  $\diamondsuit$ 3. Declarer won in dummy and played another diamond pitching the  $\heartsuit$ J, but East ruffed and exited with a heart, declarer going two down, -100.


If declarer plays the  $\heartsuit Q$  at trick three she is still in the game, but has work to do if, after drawing trumps (being careful to retain dummy's  $\heartsuit 98$ ) West ducks the diamond finesse. Declarer will then need the ruffing heart finesse to get home.





West led the  $\blacklozenge Q$ , continued with the  $\blacklozenge J$  and then switched to the  $\blacklozenge 4$  for the king and ace. If East returns a diamond at this point declarer is doomed, but she switched to the  $\heartsuit 10$  for the two, king and ace and declarer had nine winners, +600 and 10 IMPs.

A big win, 59-6 IMPs, 20-0 VP took Paris et Bordeaux, having played a match more than Alpert into the lead with an average of 15.07.



The perfect fit guaranteed ten tricks when the trumps behaved (and an overtrick was possible when South started with two rounds of spades). That was worth 11 IMPs.

Many pairs bid 4, some escaping the double that collected -300.

West led the  $\diamond K$  and switched to the  $\bigstar 5$ . Declarer ran it to her  $\bigstar Q$  and cashed two top hearts before playing a club. West took the  $\clubsuit A$  and exited with a spade. There was no way for declarer to avoid the loss of another trick, -100.

Having cashed the  $\heartsuit A$ , declarer can ruff a diamond, draw trumps, take a spade finesse, pitch a diamond on the  $\bigstar A$ , ruff a spade and then take the winning view in clubs.

Were West to be inspired and start with two rounds of clubs, declarer cannot avoid the loss of two more tricks.






# Sunday Night Fever Mark Horton



West led the  $\bigstar9$  and East won with the  $\bigstar$ K, cashed the  $\heartsuit$ K and continued with the  $\heartsuit6$ , declarer ruffing and playing a spade for the eight and ace. At this point switching to a low club or a low diamond keeps two down in the picture, but it was tempting to play a heart and declarer ruffed, cashed the  $\bigstar Q$  pitching dummy's last heart. Now a low card in either minor is declarer's best move, for example on a low diamond East wins with the king and plays a heart, but declarer ruffs, plays two rounds of diamonds, wins A high club exit with the  $\clubsuitA$  and plays back a club, scoring dummy's  $\clubsuitJ$  for one down. Were West to find the brilliant try of exiting with the  $\clubsuit6$  I would get quite a story, one way or another.

However, declarer cashed the  $\Diamond A$  and exited with a diamond, East winning with the  $\Diamond K$ . Now a club ensures two down, whereas the choice of a diamond let declarer off the hook. West won and exited with the  $\clubsuit K$ , one down, -200 and a 6 IMP loss.

It was also an important deal in the match between Austria and Paris et Bordeaux:

declarer won, cashed the  $\heartsuit K$ , went to dummy with the  $\heartsuit A$  and soon had nine tricks, +400.




North led the  $\bigstar$ 8 and declarer won in dummy, cashed the  $\heartsuit$ K and continued with a heart to the ace, South discarding the  $\bigstar$ 10. A heart to the nine was followed by the  $\bigstar$ 4 to the king and a spade to the king. Now declarer needs to play a club. If South ducks, declarer wins in dummy and exits with a club to endplay South. If South rises with the  $\bigstar$ A and plays a spade, North can overruff dummy, but declarer will only lose one more trick to the  $\diamondsuit$ A.

When declarer preferred to try ruffing a spade in dummy, North overruffed and switched to the  $\Diamond J$  and declarer had to go one down, -50 and a 10 IMP loss.

That took the match score to 22-0.






