These notes are for the convenience of players and captains. They do not substitute for the obligation to know and follow the Conditions, Regulations and Policies of the WBF covering this event.

GENERAL

- Smoking is prohibited anywhere in the venue building, including in the toilets, and in the outside smokers must stay at least five meters away from the entrances. Leaving the table during play in order to smoke is strictly forbidden and leads to severe, automatic VP penalties, and you risk expulsion (warning first, then yellow card, then red card). Smoking inside the building causes an immediate yellow card and a red comes at second offence. The use of electronic devices to smoke is subjected to the same penalties and disciplinary measures.
- The same measures as for smoking are applied to the consume of alcoholic beverages of any kind.
- Coming to the playing area under the effect of alcohol and/or drugs leads to immediate expulsion.
- Mobile phones and electronic devices capable of communication must be switched off in the playing area and must be placed in the tables' fishnet pouches i.e. they may not be brought to the toilets and never switched on during play sessions. Random checks will be made.
- All participants at the Championship venue must visibly wear their official identification badge.
- Players are requested to be seated 5 minutes before the scheduled start of play. Any team or pair that is not seated and ready to play at the start of a period of play will be subject to VP penalties. O tolerance policy applies.
- At the table, whether play is actually taking place at the moment or not, players (and NPCs) may converse only in English unless both pairs (and/or captains) agree to use some other common language at their own risk. TD adjudication will be in English only.
- During the period of play players should avoid discussions or arguments with partner or opponents. In case of a dispute a player's proper recourse is to a TD (or to the Captain of the team).

BIDDING TABLETS WILL BE IN USE: PLEASE TAKE NOTE OF THE FOLLOWING:

- Calls will be made by selecting the appropriate keys on the tablet.
- Requests for explanations of calls and play, and the responses thereto, shall be made either through tablets or in writing.
- TDs should be summoned using the appropriate button ONLY, and not raising hands or calling by voice.
- Please make reference to the dedicated section of the Conditions of Contest for further details.
- Please take note that written defences against multi 2 (2 4) are NOT allowed anymore.

DURING AND AFTER PLAY

- The opening lead must be made before the screen aperture is opened and only Declarer or Dummy may open the aperture or call for it to be opened.
- Each card should be played towards partner in a consistent manner and placed on the table in the same position each time. Once played, the player should not vary the orientation of the card.
- Quitted tricks should be placed consistently in a neat row in front of the player, evenly overlapping and at an equal distance from the previous card.
- If a player finds an opponent not following any of these rules, even after a warning, the proper recourse is to call a TD.
- If a pair should claim that the responsibility for the slow play is with their opponents, they will do so by calling a TD. TDs are authorized to remove boards when play has not finished in the allotted time or when slow play may lead to play not being finished in time. Law 86B may apply to cancelled boards.
- If a player on the side of the screen receiving the tray considers there has been a break in tempo and consequently there may be unauthorised information he should call a TD. He may do so at any time before the opening lead is made.
- Declarer enters the score on the tablet and both defenders confirm the score. After confirming the score
 - \diamond on the last board played players should leave the playing room as quickly and quietly as possible.
 - ♦ Players are strictly forbidden to watch play at any table.
- The time for a request for a TD ruling ends 30 minutes after the end of the match.
- As for asking for a review, or a score change, please make reference to the appropriate section of the Supplemental Conditions of Contest.

There has, of course, been no play as yet in the current championships, so here is a taster from last year's championships to whet your appetite.

We had a visit from two American captains, each with a story about a grand slam deal involving their teams.

At the other table, the New Zealand N/S got to $7\diamondsuit$, a good contract, but not the best available as, even with the diamonds onside, the four-one split meant that a heart finesse was required for the thirteenth trick.

For USA, Olivia Schireson opened 1° and, mindful of being vulnerable, West passed, just as was the case in the other room. Michael Xu responded 1° and Schireson jumped to 3° , GF. Xu's next bid was the key to the successful auction, repeating the chunky spades rather than supporting diamonds. A good tip is to avoid bidding weak suits on good hands, and there would always be the possibility to get back to diamonds later if it really seemed necessary.

Schireson bid $4 \heartsuit$ and now it was time for Key-card. Schireson showed three, for hearts, then the king of diamonds, and Xu was sure that Seven had to have fair play facing a hand that could force to game opposite a possibly misfitting five- or six-count, so jumped to $7 \clubsuit$.

Seven Spades is, of course, much better than $7\diamond$, as declarer will be able to ruff one or two hearts, according to the trump split, as required to establish a thirteenth trick in the suit.

On the actual deal, USA1 gained 2 IMPs. Apart from this match, there were two more pairs in $7\diamond$ and one in 7NT. Nobody else reached the top spot of $7\clubsuit$.

Technically, our second exhibit is not an American Grand, in that it was bid by the opposition, but it was a great triumph for the American team.

Cornelius Duffie decided to open very light in third seat and, when the Polish West doubled, Qinqin Wan made a simple raise to 2°. East jumped to 4 and, looking at a mere 23-count, West asked for key-cards, finding two, then for kings, finding one. So East was known to have the two black kings and the ace of diamonds, and West made the fine bid of 7% to offer a choice of grand slams.

This auction might well have been an award winner, as East made the obvious choice to leave partner in 7⁴, which was quite cold. But now Duffie came back to life with a psychic Lightner Double. What could West think? Clearly South was ruffing something, presumably a spade, so he ran to the hoped for safety of 7NT, only to find that he had been conned.

Starting with 11 top tricks, that is the number that declarer came to, so the contract was down two for -200. That wasn't quite as big a pick-up as it might have been, because in the other room the Polish North opened $3\diamond$ and, after two passes, West overcalled 3NT and played there for +660 and 13 IMPs to USA2.

Elsewhere, two pairs reached $7 \clubsuit$, going down, of course, and two bid and made $7 \clubsuit$. Their auctions were as follows:

He was impressed with the defence found by Harriet Cork and Thomas Bradkin on the first board of our Round 11 match against Chinese Taipei.

Harriet Cork, North, opened $1\diamond - I$ thoroughly approve of opening 11-counts at love all - East overcalled 1NT, then West transferred to spades and bid 3NT, which became the final contract. Thomas Bradkin, naturally, led his partner's suit, and intelligently chose the nine, which had the effect of taking an 'intra-finesse' – the defence can now establish the diamonds for only one loser.

Declarer won the first trick with the jack and tried the spade finesse, which lost, and now Harriet played her part by returning the queen of diamonds to the king and ace, pinning dummy's ten. Thomas cashed the eight of diamonds then continued the fine defence by switching to a club, rather than leading a fourth diamond which his partner would have had to win and which would have left her with no effective exit card. Declarer had to take dummy's ace to avoid going off at once but, with the spades blocked, he could take only two tricks in the suit and, despite the friendly lie of the hearts, could come to only eight in all.

At the other table, the three of diamonds lead went to the queen and ace (North could have brought off the same intrafinesse by playing the seven, but couldn't possibly know to do that). Will Battersby took the spade finesse, the defence played more diamonds, and so declarer made 11 tricks. That was 11 IMPs to England, and an eventual narrow win in the match.

Anders Brogeland of the Norwegian U21 team found a neat ducking play on this deal which was overlooked by his counterpart at the other table.

At the other table there was no 1° overcall, but North led the three of hearts anyway, West having bid spades then clubs before admitting to a heart stopper. South won the ace at trick one and continued with a low heart to declarer's ace. It would not have been clear to declarer, Christian Johnsen, who had the heart length, only that they might be five-two, if the defensive carding to these two tricks was to be believed. However, declarer picked up the diamonds successfully, leading low to the ace then back to the king, and came to 10 tricks for +430. Magnus Saetre also led the three of hearts, but Brogeland followed with an encouraging four, playing for the heart lay-out to be exactly as it was. Not only did this keep defensive communications open, but it also seems to have convinced declarer that it was North who held the heart length. That being the case, South rated to have the diamond length, so he won the ten of hearts, led a diamond to the ace, and back to the jack, losing to the doubleton queen. Saetre duly led his remaining heart, and Brogeland cashed four of those for, apparently, down two for -100 and 11 IMPs to Norway. Don't ask me where the second undertrick comes from.

Eric Bô sent in a message to point out an interesting ending on this deal from Round 12 of the U31 championship.



This was the auction at one table, $2\clubsuit$ followed by $3\clubsuit$ of course being an attempt to play in the latter contract.

West led the nine of spades, declarer winning in dummy to preserve his spade entry to hand for later in the play. Declarer led a low heart off the dummy and East played low, so he won the $\heartsuit J$ and played a second heart. That did not look so good when East won the queen and ace of hearts then played a fourth round.

It may not have looked so good for declarer, but it actually meant that the contract was now cold as the cards lay. Can you see it?

Declarer wins the fourth heart and cashes all the spades, and neither opponent can afford to discard a diamond, else a diamond to the queen and a diamond back sets up two tricks in the suit while declarer still has the ace of clubs to get back in with. So both defenders must come down to a singleton club and, if declarer has read the position correctly, dummy has two cards in each minor. He cashes the ace of clubs and leads low towards the $\Diamond Q$, and the small club is his tenth trick. Both defenders have been squeezed in the same two suits.

The best chance for the defence is for East to keep two clubs and two diamonds, and West three diamonds. Now declarer has to come down to three diamonds in dummy, else East can rise with the ace on the first diamond and return a club, leaving the diamonds blocked.

Sadly for us, declarer did not find this position in real life, so was down one.

In the other room, the Israeli N/S had bid to the cold 6^{4} , played by South, for a safe and secure +920.

Here, Tim Van de Paverd opened **2** with the North hand, showing either a weak two bid in clubs, or a game-forcing hand. I doubt that Oscar Nijssen had too much difficulty in guessing which hand-type his partner held on this occasion.

Two No Trump asked, 3 said something but I don't know what, but the important thing was that when Nijssen set trumps, his partner could show the ace of diamonds, after which Nijssen asked, found two key-cards, and bid the club slam.

West, Ami Zamir, led the ten of hearts, their systemic lead against a NT contract, and Oren Toledano signalled with the nine. Nijssen won the heart and tested the diamonds. However, Zamir showed out on the second round, pitching a spade, so Nijssen abandoned diamonds for now and turned his attention to clubs.

On the third club, East threw a spade, and on the fourth, the eight of hearts, then another spade on the fifth. Meanwhile, West discarded two more spades, and Nijssen, who had clearly seen the ending that he wanted to play for, bared the king of spades. Finally, he cashed the ace of diamonds, and that forced West down to a bare ace of spades. Nijssen came to hand with a heart, eliminating East's last card in the suit, then exited with the king of spades to the ace, and West had to lead away from the jack of hearts and round to declarer's queen-seven; 12 tricks bid and made for +990 and +2 IMPs to Netherlands.

'If only I had led a low heart at trick one,' thought West.
