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MIXED PAIRS FORMAT UPDATE

- The Final will be played by a total of 26 pairs (see SCoCo): 2 from Semifinal B, and the rest from Semifinal A + drop-ins (potentially 5).
- There will be no carry-over from one stage to another.

SENIOR PAIRS FORMAT UPDATE

- The Final will be played by 18 pairs: 2 from Semifinal B, and the rest from Semifinal A + drop-ins (potentially 3).
- There will be no carry-over from one stage to another.

BARBADOS SWISS CUP UPDATE

- The number of qualifiers for the Final is 8, including drop-ins (potentially 2).

FIRST WEEK BAM UPDATE

- The number of qualifiers for the Final is still to be determined, being highly dependent on drop-ins. At the moment they should be 14, including drop-ins (potentially 5).
- There will be no carry-over from one stage to another.

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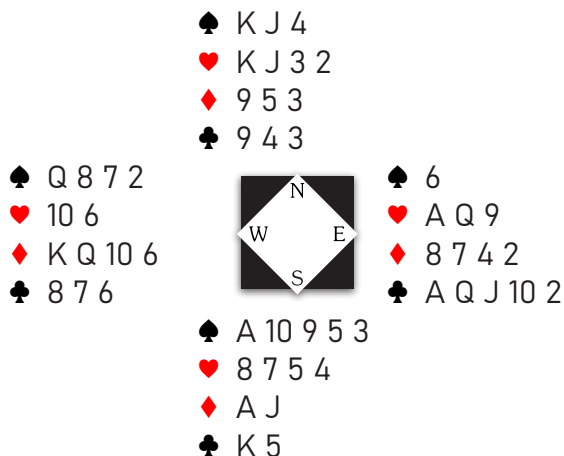
Mixed Teams Championship, Round of 32

The last session of R32 started off with a few matches that were very close. The most interesting seemed to be Ticket to Ride (Auken-Welland, A. Grossack-E. Kolesnik) v. Dinkin (-Av. Silverstein, Yilmaz-Özbay), Ticket to Ride leading by just 4 IMP.

Avery Silverstein (East) had an interesting problem on board 15 when Welland opened a systemic 1♣:

Was it safe to bid 3♣ now? Where were all the spades? It would have been better had she bid 2♣ in the first round. Eventually, she decided to pass and Welland scored +140.

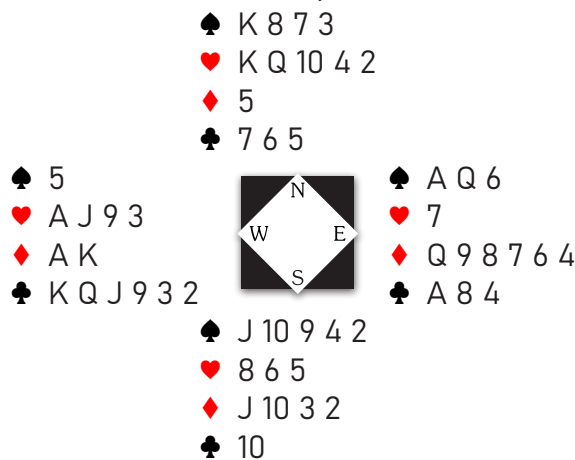

Well bid but now you have to make it, too.

North led ♥K to the ace. Grossack had a choice: he could either try to ruff two hearts (could be dangerous) or finesse in spades because North probably would have ♠K.

He began with two rounds of trumps, ruffed a heart with ♣A, reached his hand in diamonds and ran the clubs. Then came ♦K but when North revoked, he simply took the finesse in spades. 13 IMPs to Ticket to Ride.

6♠ was bid 8 times. N/S played 4 times in 5♣ doubled (-3).



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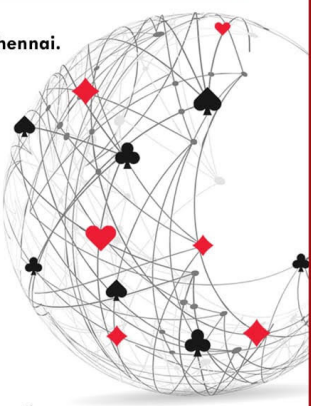
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Mixed Teams Championship, Round of 16

There's a saying in American basketball: Give each team 100 points and let them play the last two minutes of the fourth quarter. In the Mixed Teams, some matches came down to those final few boards, with late swings deciding who would advance to the quarterfinals.

In the less-close matches, China2 maintained control over Qingdao Sailun, winning 119-76.

SIVY B cruised past GR4S, pulling away in the third quarter with a 30-3 set to win 135-109.

In Platinum vs. Shen, Shen led 107-80 after three quarters, but Platinum came storming back in the fourth, outscoring Shen 62-14 to win 142-121.

Daugava led Geely Automobile by 16 IMPs at halftime, but Geely shifted into high gear after the break, taking the third quarter 59-19 and the fourth 29-7 to advance to the quarterfinals.

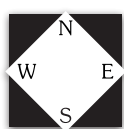
Bulgaria Mixed also had to withstand a late charge. After holding a comfortable halftime lead, they were outscored 40-18 by Rosenthal in the third set. Bulgaria Mixed held on, however, winning 117-102.

Bakke and Bedford found the winning route to the easier 3NT contract. When South led the ♠Q, Bakke played low from the dummy, noting North's ♠9, and won in hand with the king. He led the ♦J, won by North with the queen. Kaplan switched to the ♥J, won in dummy. Next came the ♠7, North playing the ♥8. After South won the spade, she led the ♥Q. Declarer knocked out the remaining high diamond and claimed for +430 and 10 IMPs to Bhargava, who now trailed by only 7 IMPs. Could they get that on the last

board?

When East bid 6♦ Christina told me her instinct was to bid 7♣ over 6♦, but having done everything wrong for three days in a row she second guessed herself (we have all been there and have the t-shirt).

North led the ♠6 and declarer did not find a route to 12 tricks and 14 IMPs went to Zhang.

One does exist, but it is not easy.

Declarer must win with dummy's ♠Q, come to hand with a club, ruff a heart, play a diamond to the king, cash the ♠AK and run the ♦J. When it holds dummy is entered with a club and declarer plays two rounds of diamonds, ditching the losing hearts.

Yalcin Aydar made 6♠ after the lead of the ♥9 for Mixed Teams in their match against London Calling, worth 11 IMPs when EW stopped in 5♣ in the other room.

Could anyone reach the excellent 7♣?

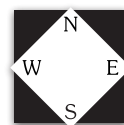

At the tables where the ♠K was led at trick one, declarer could not manage more than 11 tricks, but suppose South were to start with the ♦K?

Declarer takes dummy's $\spadesuit$ A, ruffs a diamond and plays the $\heartsuit$ Q South winning and probably switching to the $\clubsuit$ K. Declarer wins, ruffs a heart, ruffs a diamond, ruffs a heart and cashes the $\spadesuit$ J discarding the losing club. Amusingly, this line also works if declarer plays the $\heartsuit$ 9 at trick three!

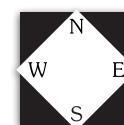
