They had several chances to take the lead in the third quarter, but they managed to gain only 1 IMP. Going into the final set, Yettick led 95-87. They picked up 4 IMPs immediately on a doubled game, but Sivy B was not out of it by any means.

In the Closed Room, Zach Grossack led the ♠Q and eventually escaped for two down while Debbie went down three, giving Yettick another 3 IMPs.

Two bold bids by West and South helped Yettick: Vist's jump to 4♠ shut North–South out, while at the other table Zach Grossack, sitting South, forced to game with a 3♠ cuebid. That was 8 IMPs to Yettick. The lead was now a nearly insurmountable 19 IMPs.

Lin led a passive ♦5, declarer's jack holding the trick as West played the 4. Next came a low club from dummy to the queen and king. Lin continued with diamonds, declarer taking the

queen with the king in hand to play clubs again. When she went up with the ace, the contract was going down two. With Sivy B stopping in game at the other table, they won 13 IMPs, but it was not enough. Yettick won the match 116–110.

China2 was swinging for the fences. 4♥ was down five, for -1100. Meanwhile, 4NT was certainly manageable on the lead of the ♠6. This was ducked around to declarer's 8 for the ♦7, 2, jack and queen. West now led the ♥5 to declarer's queen, East playing the 6. Declarer played a diamond to the ace and a spade to the queen and king. East exited with another spade to dummy's 10, and now declarer needs to play either of the ♣98, running it to East if West doesn't cover. As it happened, the ♦9 was led and North couldn't get the clubs going. Down one meant another 15 IMPs to Ticket to Ride, who will meet Yettick in the final.

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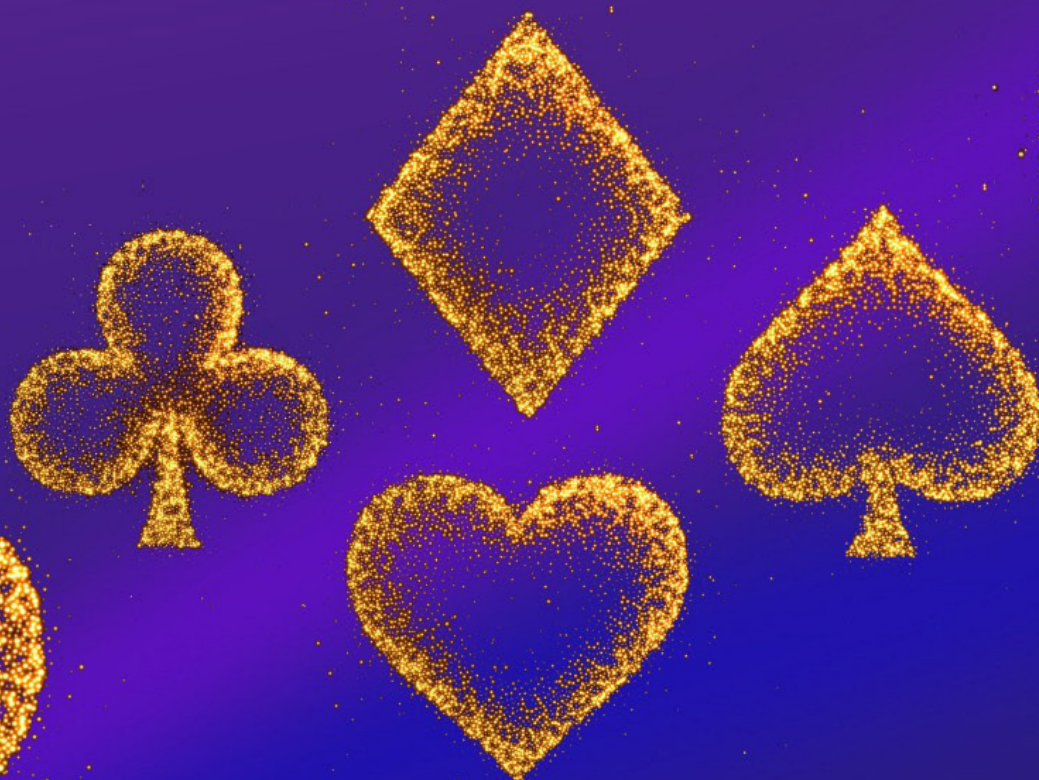
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Stars on Parade

The perceived wisdom is that with an outside entry you lead an honour from a suit headed by the KQ and Zia went with the ♠Q, declarer winning with the ♠A and playing the ♥4 for the queen and ace. Back came the ♠8 and declarer was allowed to win with dummy's ♠10. He cashed the ♣K and played a diamond for the queen, king and ace and three spade tricks later he was one down, -100.

North stated with the ♣K followed by the ♣J and when declarer discarded a heart on the second round of the suit South played two rounds of spades, declarer winning, playing a heart to the ace and the ♦Q. South does best to withhold the ♦K but he covered and declarer won and took a shot at making by running the ♦10. South won and played a club, declarer ruffing and playing the ♦2. North's ruff with the ♠10 meant two down, -300 and 9 IMPs to Milner.

If East passes and South responds 1NT North bids 2♦. Now a double at least shows where you live. If West bids 3♣, NS have to decide if it's right to bid on to 3♦ - and both sides can score nine tricks in their minor suit fits.

North led the ♦9 and South won and returned the ♦6 establishing enough tricks for one down, -100.

West led the ♠Q and declarer won and continued with the ♠J followed by the ♠10, West winning as East discarded the ♥2. He switched to the ♥Q and when declarer ducked (winning is best, but there is still work to do) he continued with the ♥3. Declarer won with dummy's ♥A and cashed the ♠9. East needed to pitch a heart on that, but it is not an obvious move and he parted with the ♦8. A diamond for the jack, queen and king saw West return the ♦2 and declarer took dummy's ♦A, collecting East's ♦10. A diamond to the nine was followed by a heart to the king and the ♣7. East won with the ♣K and returned the ♣5 but declarer let it run to dummy's ♣J for +400 and 7 IMPs to Milner.

Something strange happened on Board 25. NS held ♠K762 ♥AKQ8 ♦106 ♣K96 facing ♠J ♥J4 ♦98542 ♠AQ1042 and both teams reached 3NT. East was on lead with ♠A854 ♥10653 ♦A73 ♣53 and led a heart. Declarer could cash four hearts and five clubs for +150, but in the Closed Room declarer inadvertently played the ♣K under dummy's ♠A and finished three down, -150 giving Simson 7 IMPs.

South led the ♥5 and North won with the ♥A and returned the ♥6, ducked to dummy's ♥8. Declarer cashed five diamonds and South came down to ♠J ♥KJ3 ♣K2. When declarer guessed to play a club to the ace and exit with a heart he was one down, -50.

I'm sure you can see that cashing the ♠A and then exiting with a heart will eventually force South to lead a club into dummy's ♠AQ, but we can see all 52 cards.

To be sure of defeating 3NT North must switch to a club at trick two. South wins and must then play a spade, North winning with the ♠K and playing another club.

East led the ♠Q and continued with the ♠3, declarer taking West's ♠J with the ♠A while pitching dummy's ♣3. He cashed the ♦A and played a second diamond, but when East discarded the ♥2 West won with the ♦9 and switched to the ♣8. Declarer cashed his winners and eventually scored an eighth trick with a heart, but that was -100.

One way to make 3NT is to cross to dummy with the ♣J at trick three and play a low diamond planning to put in the ♦10. Then declarer cashes three clubs making life awkward for West, who has to keep two spades. He can't spare a heart as declarer could then play two rounds of hearts, so he must part with a diamond. Declarer now plays two rounds of diamonds and West wins and must play a heart but declarer takes the ♥A and exits with a heart and must come to another trick in one of the majors.

If West plays the ♦J on the first round of the suit declarer wins with the ♦A and has more than one way to secure nine tricks.

At halftime, the semifinal between Ticket to Ride and China2 looked decided because Ticket to Ride were leading 79-21. The Seniors final was much closer: Milner led 80-70. The other mixed semifinal was even closer, with Yettick having the edge over Sivy B by 63-54. The latter thus will be the main match in this report with a look or two at proceedings in the other matches.

The first board of the set looked like a friendly warming-up board for all players: a routine 3NT with an overtrick or two. However, the E/W pair of the Ticket to Ride team went overboard and landed in 6NT, a contract that might have been made but only on a very, very good day. We will skip this board but keep in mind that it might also be the start of a rearguard action by China2.

On the next board, a classic problem of judgement once again came up.

Sivy B +650. With the diamonds 3-3, a shift to that suit would not have done any good to the defence either.

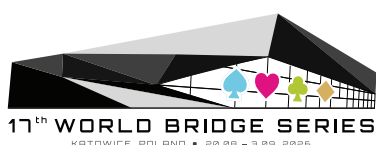

The auction lasted for several minutes, getting slower as it progressed. It seems that Amber Lin's 4♦ was RKCB finding the ♠A. 4♠ asked for kings and 5♦ located the ♦K. So far so good, whether I have read the auction correctly or not.

With a gain of 13 IMPs waiting to be collected, Lin thought for ages over 5♦. She eventually bid 7♣, losing 12 IMP instead of gaining 13. What do you make of that? If she wanted to know whether East's heart control was a singleton or void, she could have passed over South's double of 4♥. (Partner's redouble would then show a void). Apart from that, East had rebid only 2♣, so it was not certain that the other table would reach 6♣. The odds for bidding 7♣ do not look good to me. If East held only seven clubs, and maybe 3-0-3-7 shape, what then?

There are four quarterfinals. The other contracts were: two in 3NT, one in 4NT and three in 6♣. So, four out of eight stopped in game. You need very good odds before risking 7♣.

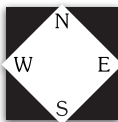

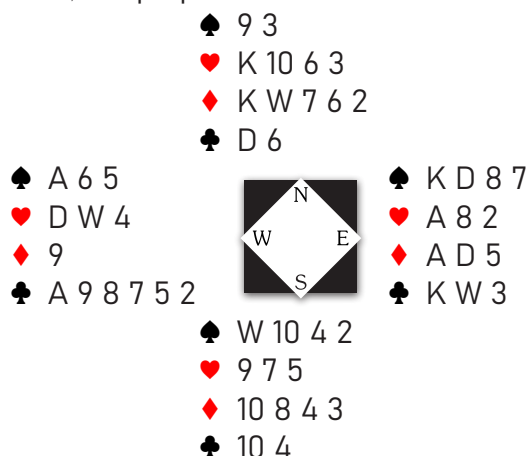

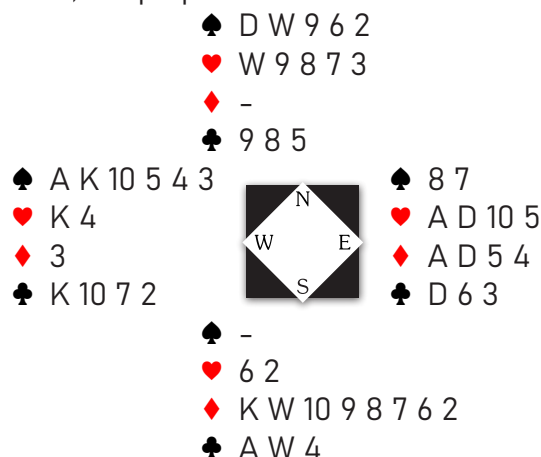
