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THE RULE OF EIGHT



The qualifying stage is over, and Hefei now counts in eights. The championship reshapes itself into tighter groups of eight: in the A Final of every category the world title is on the line, while the other finals play for the medals of their own group.

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JOAN GERARD YOUTH AWARDS

The Joan Gerard Youth Awards aim at rewarding aptitude, fair play, good sportsmanship and a friendly international spirit, rejecting any discrimination. They will be presented every year at the Youth Bridge Teams Championships and at the World Youth Transnational Bridge Championships to a player from each category (U26, U26W, U21, U16, U31).

Each of the attending players, NPCs, coaches, WBF championship officials and members of the staff can nominate one player per category to receive the Joan Gerard Youth Award. No one can nominate players from his/her own country.

The final selection will be made by a Commission composed of the members of the Championship Committee and chaired by the Master of Protocol & Ceremony. The result will be announced and the Joan Gerard Youth Awards presented at the Prize-giving Ceremony.

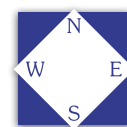

- 2♣ Artificial GF
- 2♥ Min without other major
- 2NT Waiting
- 3♠ Short in ♣, 4+♦
- 4♦ Sets trumps
- 4♥ Last train, 4♠ could be to play with e.g. 6-4, so 4♥ is slam try, agreeing ♦
- 4NT RKCB
- 5♠ 2 with ♦Q, West upgrading his length
- 7♦ Must be cold, partner shows ♦Q, so he has extra length in ♦.

We do not know the meaning of all their bids but E/W themselves certainly knew what they were doing.

As you can see now, they knew exactly what they were doing. Scoring +2140 was worth 17 IMPs to them when the Aussie E/W ended up in just 5♦.

The slam was bid at least once in all five sections of these championships, i.e. about 10 times in our around 200 tables overall. Only in the U16, a declarer went down in 7♦ though getting to the grand at such a young age deserves a separate honourable mention. It looks as if you might go down by taking the immediate spade finesse rather than the slightly better chance of trying to ruff out the ♠K in two rounds.

would have the option of passing. Not at all easy.

North led the ♥2 and South won with the ♥J and returned the ♥7, declarer winning with dummy's ♥A and playing a diamond for the nine, queen and king. Back came the ♥K and declarer ruffed, went to dummy with a club and ran the ♦6. North won and switched to the ♠9 and declarer pitched a club, South winning with the ♠A and returning a spade (a heart is best). Declarer won with the ♥K but now played on clubs, finishing three down, -150.

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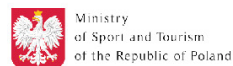

The advantage of a Swiss movement is that the stronger teams can never relax because the top teams always have to play a contestant who himself has a good chance of qualifying. The slight disadvantage for a reporter might be, of course, that he is restricted to reporting about the same leading teams every round, due to the broadcasting program. As a consolation for your reporter: the leading teams usually would produce the better bridge and thus would be much more worthwhile to report about.

The round started with a funny little board, I thought.

The popular denomination was, of course, spades. At eight of our 22 tables in the U26, N/S got as high as 4♠. The U21 still have to learn a lot about overbidding because at their 34 tables, only six pairs got to 4♠ so there is still some hope for the future. Not that you are well advised to reach 4♠; even 3♠ is already too high though the correct

defence to 3♠ was missed in a scientific way on quite a number of occasions. It's so easy: three top diamonds, the ♠A and then... sit back and relax. Don't be the learned expert who would now play into the triple void: dummy sheds a heart, declarer (over) ruffs and the other heart loser disappears on the ♠Q. Nine tricks. We saw it at quite a few tables.

Real fun occurred at the two tables where North opened 1NT and East doubled. The defence took their five minor suit top tricks and exited with another club. At one table declarer now had the rest and duly collected five spades, two top hearts and a club for +380. The name of these lucky fellows: "Dummy's revenge." Seldom have I seen such an adequate name for a team... At the other 1NTX table, declarer also had the rest, of course, but he did not know



and decided to finesse the ♠Q through the doubler (East). Suddenly, the defence had most of the rest: down three for -800...

Two boards later, I saw a reminiscence of the wisdom of both Benito Garozzo and Bob Hamman.

The popular contract on this board was 4♠, of course. According to Garozzo, who by the way will be 99 next month (insh'allah or so), leading a singleton against a trump contract is a good idea more often than not. On this board, it would certainly have been useful because the alternative, the ♦K lead, will enable declarer to draw trumps and make his contract.



In the auction, Bob Hamman's famous adage also would have worked. "If one of your options is 3NT, then bid it." Duck the diamond lead twice and there is time to establish a heart trick. Not that 3NT is an advisable contract but that's another story.

I will skip a few boards now ("for the obvious reason") and move to board 22, on which there were significant swings in all our four featured matches.
